DISCUSSIONS TOOLKIT

Audience: Someone who is interested in the issue.

Purpose: To help someone understand the issue

Structure: Paragraphs, in a logical order, discussion contrasting points.

Language features:

- Logical connectives
- Formal and impersonal • language
- Present tense
- Write in the third person

Examples of discussions: A leaflet or article putting forward both

- sides of an issue
- Write up of a debate
- Newspaper article

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Remember to:

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- Write a title that says what you are discussing.
- Write an introduction that tells the reader what the discussion is about.
- Write in a logical order. Start each new section with a topic sentence.
- Write one paragraph for each point then do the same thing for the point against.
- Write a conclusion

It is important to...

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- Write in the present tense and the third person (he, she...).
- Use technical vocabulary.
- Include words to show reasons (because, so...).
- Use connecting phrases to signal points (e.g. first of all...).
- Use 'weasel words' to back up points (probably...).
- Use phrases that signal both sides of an argument (e.g. some people believe...)
 - Give facts to back up points.

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
